

100 days of Labour

Public give thumbs down to government's first 100 days

- Asked to grade the Government's performance the country gives Labour a "D minus" on its first 100 days
- The public are over three times more likely to say that the government has had a bad start (65%) than a good one (19%)
- Winter Fuel Allowance changes are overwhelmingly seen as government's biggest mistake
- Labour poll lead has evaporated the Conservatives and Labour are now tied at 27 per cent each with Reform on 21 per cent.
- Starmer's net approval rating has fallen almost 50 points to -38 since his post election high an all-time-low. A third of Labour voters say Starmer has underperformed expectations.
- More people prefer the last Conservative Government to the current one and the public are more likely to say things would be better than worse if the Conservatives had stayed in office.

More in Common UK Director Luke Tryl said "From a public opinion perspective the first 100 days of a Labour Government could be described as disappointing at best. The public are fairly united in saying the Government has had a bad start, and rate the Government's performance as a D minus, meanwhile their poll lead has evaporated and Keir Starmer's approval sits in the doldrums.

Starmer and Labour will have to hope that the changes in Downing Street and a positive budget narrative give them the opportunity to turn public opinion around, because in an age of increasingly impatient and volatile electorates the public mood could soon crystalise against them"

Public gives government a "D minus"

- Two in three Britons (65%) say the new government is off to a bad start (vs 19% who say a good one).
- Seven in ten (71%) think the government has not yet made much or any progress.
- Asked to grade the new Government the average grade voters give Labour is a D-, while Labour voters give them a C+

Labour has underperformed expectations

- Half the public (49%) say Labour's time in government so far has made them less optimistic that they will do a good job. Older people in particular are less optimistic about the government now.
- Even among Labour voters a third (36%) say that Starmer has underperformed their expectations, and that Labour's time in government so far has made them less optimistic that they will do a good job.

Starmer's approval has plummeted since the election

Starmer's approval rating has reached a new low of -38, down 49 points since his post-election high and similar to Sunak's lows during the election . Starmer's approval is now lower than Rishi Sunak who sits on -31.

Labour's lead has evaporated

Labour is down seven points from it's election result in current voting intention. The Conservatives are up three and Reform UK are up seven.



More Britons prefer the last government than the current one

30% of the public think it would be better now if the Conservatives had won the election, compared to 24% who think it would have been worse and 25% who think it would be the same. Britons are also now more likely to say they prefer the previous government (34%) than the current one (31%).

Winter Fuel Allowance seen as the biggest mistake

- Winter fuel allowance changes are seen as the main failure, followed by early prisoner release and not yet resolving issues with the NHS and illegal immigration.
- The public see the government's main success so far as handling of the riots, and holding water companies to account.

Winter Fuel Allowance - in their words

"Labour have come in and started with cutting the winter fuel for the pensioners. I know they're trying to recuperate some of the massive debt that we have in this country, but I think there's certain ways to go about things and other ways to try and recuperate the debt that we're in, rather than being very harsh." "I don't think they should be handing out 300 pounds to every single pensioner every single winter because there are some pensioners that have enough money to pay for themselves and their heating. If you have plenty of money, why should the government be helping you out rather than helping other people? I mean maybe a single mum for example, who can't afford, they could be given funding, but obviously it's difficult. I dunno where the margin is, where they say you can't have that money anymore because of the cost of living. I'm sure a lot of people are struggling, more people are struggling. "I think the problem they've got is they've done it far too low and there's too many pensioners that have, like Alison said, who potentially got an extra couple of pounds a week on a small private pension that they save for who are now not going to have that money and they're on the poverty line."

Winners and losers

In the eyes of the public, train drivers and doctors are getting a good deal, followed by trade unions, while pensioners and working people get a bad one.

Cut-through

Winter fuel allowance changes have cut through - almost nine in ten Britons know about this, and it was broadly seen to reflect poorly on Labour - just as poorly as Sunak leaving D-Day commemorations.



Blunder Barometer

"I was obviously hoping, I know it's not been that long, but I was hoping that there would be some changes for the benefit of everybody. But all we keep hearing at the moment is about what they're doing to pensioners by cutting their funding" Sam, Administrator, Watford, Liberal Democrat voter:

Popular policies are not widely known

The most widely known government actions are changes to winter fuel allowance (58%) and early prisoner release (53%). The public is less aware of other changes - for example, though a popular policy in theory, only 21% know about the Employment Rights Bill. In focus groups, stories about government donations and the Winter Fuel Allowance cuts have had far greater cut through than any policies on renters' or workers' rights for example.

Labour have not convinced the public they represent something different

- The public are more likely to say sleaze and corruption has stayed the same (36%) or got worse (33%) than got better (17%) since the change of government.
- And the government is still not seen to have a clear direction the public are more likely to think Labour does not have a plan for what they intend to achieve in government (44%), than that they do (32%).



So far has the Labour government been...

Freebie gate has undermined trust

"I think it's a problem with all the politicians. The problem that Labour's got is that they came in on a ticket that we're different and we're not like the Tories. They're the ones that did all these things and then within the first few weeks they've then shown that actually they've got the snouts in the trough as much as anybody else"

"In the past few days, Stamer has been given gifts of a hundred thousand pounds or something like that. So these big politicians, they don't have a clue.
