



How did the Seven Segments vote?




The public are balancers, not 'builders' or 'blockers'

If there were proposals to build new homes in your local area, which comes closest to your view?


- I would likely support any new development would likely be good for my local area and local residents




"There is a housing crisis in the UK, but not in my area"




Why do the public think Britain has a housing crisis?

Does Britain build enough homes?


- In Britain, we are not building enough homes to keep up with population growth

New homes are unaffordable and don't help local people


New developments concrete over the countryside and are a blight on the landscape

We don't need new housing developments, we need less people coming into the country


Britain is too full already, and there is already enough development




Percent convincing minus percent unconvincing

What are the benefits of housebuilding?




So, what solutions do the public want to see?

Which of the following solutions to the housing crisis should the Government prioritise?




Britons are sceptical of planning reform
